

## Communication Development Chart

**NOTE:** Each child develops uniquely, even within the same family, and may meet certain milestones earlier or later than others. If your child does not meet many of the milestones within their age range, reach out to us for a consultation.

Age	Milestones
2 to 3 Years Old	<ul> <li>Tries to get your attention by saying things like Look at me!</li> <li>Says their name when asked.</li> <li>Uses some plural words like birds or toys.</li> <li>Uses verbs that end in ing like eating or running. Adds -ed to the end of words to talk about past actions, like looked or played.</li> <li>Gives reasons for things and events, like saying that they need a coat when it's cold outside.</li> <li>Asks why and how.</li> <li>Answers questions like "What do you do when you are sleepy?" or "Which one can you wear?"</li> <li>Correctly pronounces p, b, m, h, w, d, and n in words.</li> <li>Correctly pronounces most vowels in words.</li> <li>Speech is becoming clearer but may not be understandable to unfamiliar listeners or to people who do not know your child.</li> </ul>
3 to 4 Years Old	<ul> <li>Compares things, with words like bigger or shorter.</li> <li>Tells you a story from a book or a video.</li> <li>Understands and uses more location words, like inside, on, and under.</li> <li>Uses words like a or the when talking, like a book or the dog.</li> <li>Pretends to read alone or with others.</li> <li>Recognizes signs and logos like STOP.</li> <li>Pretends to write or spell and can write some letters.</li> <li>Correctly pronounces t, k, g, f, y, and words ending in ing.</li> <li>Says all the syllables in a word.</li> <li>Says the sounds at the beginning, middle, and end of words.</li> <li>By age 4 years, your child talks smoothly. Does not repeat sounds, words, or phrases most of the time.</li> <li>By age 4 years, your child speaks so that people can understand most of what they say. Child may make mistakes on sounds that are later to develop—like l, j, r, sh, ch, s, v, z, and th.</li> <li>By age 4 years, your child says all sounds in words containing two or more consonants in a row—like the tw in tweet or the -nd in sand. May not say all sounds correctly—for example, spway for "spray."</li> </ul>
4 to 5 Years Old	<ul> <li>□ Produces grammatically correct sentences. Sentences are longer and more complex.</li> <li>□ Includes (1) main characters, and words like and to connect information and (2) ideas to tell stories.</li> <li>□ Uses at least one irregular plural form, like feet or men.</li> <li>□ Understands and uses location words, like behind, beside, and between.</li> <li>□ Uses more words for time—like yesterday and tomorrow—correctly.</li> <li>□ Follows simple directions and rules to play games.</li> <li>□ Locates the front of a book and its title.</li> <li>□ Recognizes and names 10 or more letters and can usually write their own name.</li> <li>□ Imitates reading and writing from left to right.</li> <li>□ Blends word parts, like cup + cake = cupcake. Identifies some rhyming words, like cat and hat.</li> <li>□ Pronounces most consonants correctly, and speech is understandable in conversation.</li> </ul>
